The traditional Lenten means of preparing our hearts for Easter are prayer, fasting, and alms giving. For those who will one day find their way to Heaven, these are sure, safe, and effective means of getting there. As a reminder:

Days of Fasting:

Catholics from ages 18-59 are to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Fasting means eating one full meal and two smaller meals; no snacks.

Days of Abstinence:

Catholics from age 14 years and older are to abstain from eating meat on Ash Wednesday, all Fridays in Lent and Good Friday. This obligation ends with death.

To have a prayer added to St. John's Prayer Chain, please call Shirley 715-384-3613 and Donna 715-384-2479 (there are 2 lists).

Ash Wednesday - February 17th: On Ash Wednesday, St. John's will have a 6:30am Mass, an 8:00am (students only) Mass, and an Ash Wednesday service at 12:15pm and again at 6:00pm. At the service there will be Readings and the distribution of ashes. These will not be Masses.

Additional Confessions during Lent: Confessions will be available Friday, February 19th, and every Friday during March (5th, 12th, 19th & 26th) beginning at 6pm. Two priests will be available.

There is a box located in the back of church until the end of March for you to discard old palms. Since they were blessed, they should not be thrown away. They will be burned and buried properly.

Stations of the Cross will be held on Fridays at 5:30pm the following Fridays: Feb. 19th, 26th, March 5th, 12th, 19th, and 26th.

Lenten Spiritual Books: Are you looking for a way this Lent to develop a more fervent practice of your faith? In the entryway of the church there are books to help guide you through the holy season of Lent. The *Magnificat Lenten Companion*, *Lent for Kids* and *Lent for Families* are all available. A free will offering is appreciated.

Diaconate Discernment Retreat Are you a man at least 35 years of age who feels a yearning to give yourself more radically to the service of God and the Church – preaching the Gospel, serving those in need, assisting at the altar? If you think God may be calling you to be a deacon, talk to your pastor about attending the Diaconate Discernment Retreat at St. Mary's Church in Altoona on February 27th, 2021. FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

THOUGHTS ON A HOLY LENT

HOW CAN WE LIVE A BETTER LENT?

There are many resources to help us live a better Lent, so today we will take a look at some things we can do to grow in holiness this year. How often do you check your phone or how much time is spent messaging each day? For most of us, this is getting to be something we do many times a day, even in the midst of regular business, driving the car, at the grocery store or any number of things we do every day. If we spent even a tiny amount of that time praying or reading Sacred Scripture, this could be a great way to grow in our relationship with God this Lent.

How can we do this? Place an app on your phone that takes you to a Sacred Scripture site. When you open your phone, before checking your email, read a line or two from the Bible; before checking your Facebook, read a line or two from the Bible; before looking at your calendar, read a line from the bible. Pope Francis says in this way our everyday activities can be a path of holiness that can lead us into a deeper relationship with our heavenly Father.

PRAY FOR YOURSELF AND YOUR FAMILY

In some parts of the world, there is a family tradition of offering a decade of the rosary for the family each day. Making this a priority and doing it each day takes only about 3 minutes. The prayer can be offered for any family member you choose. You could offer this for one that is fallen away from the faith, perhaps a sibling you don't see eye to eye with, a parent, grandparent or other who is suffering, a child going through a difficult time or in need of a job or perhaps there is need of forgiveness within the family ties. Satan attacks the family in so many ways, and this little way can offer a shield of protection for them and yourself. Offer up these 3 minutes a day for the Lenten season and see if God doesn't begin to open doors.

WHY DON'T CATHOLICS EAT MEAT ON FRIDAYS DURING LENT?

And why do some continue this practice throughout the year?

This tradition has been observed for centuries as a way to mark the day Jesus gave of himself on the cross for our salvation on Good Friday afternoon, and it is fake news that it came about due to any of the following: it has nothing to do with food safety, protecting the fishing industry (or here in Wisconsin the fish fry industry) or due to meat being scarce and expensive in the past or even as a way to more perfectly imitate the simplicity of Jesus' lifestyle. Abstinence is one of our oldest traditions, and can be traced to the first century. Until 1966, this was part of Canon Law for every Friday during the year, but now is only required on Ash Wednesday and Fridays during Lent. With the correct intention, this is also a form of penance and prayer. It is a visible reminder to turn away from sin and back to God. When we abstain from meat, we take the focus off ourselves and place it on Jesus upon the cross and the sacrifice he made for us, desiring to unite ourselves with this sacrifice in a small way.

One point that is often missed is that while the call to abstain from meat on Fridays throughout the year has been removed, the requirement to offer some sort of sacrifice, penance or prayer every Friday to unite ourselves with Christ on his cross has not been removed. This is why many Catholics continue to refrain from eating meat on Friday. United to the infinite sacrifice of Christ on his cross, our small sacrifice of a meatless Friday attains infinite merit as well. We see abstinence as more than a negative 'going without' or a reminder of that day he suffered on the cross, it is itself a prayer and a way of uniting with his sacrifice, offering ourselves as a vessel through which he can work in our world.

There are no teachers in small groups. Trained parishioners facilitate conversations. The groups will:

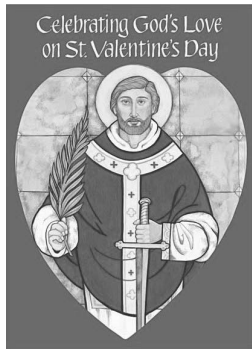
- Discuss life and faith
