FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

MEET THE SAINTS - ST. PATRICK

In today's article, we will introduce you to St. Patrick, arguably one of the best known saints in Catholic history. Almost everyone has heard of this great saint of Ireland, but were you aware he was not of Irish descent? Patrick was of Scottish heritage. His father was a high ranking officer in the Roman military, and his mother was from what is France today (Gaul), and was a close relative of St. Martin of Tours.

In his teens, Patrick was taken hostage by a raiding party from Ireland, and sold as a slave to a chieftain named Milchu in Ireland. He was a shepherd for Milchu's flock for six years before he escaped back to England. He experienced a conversion while in captivity, turning to prayer many times a day.


After his escape, Patrick began studies for becoming a priest. He studied in Gaul before being ordained to the priesthood under St. Germain. When Germain was sent to Britain as an ambassador, Patrick accompanied him. It was here that Patrick's thoughts returned to Ireland, and he had a vision of the children of Focluth crying out: "O holy youth, come back to Erin, and walk once more amongst us."

Patrick was the second missionary to Ireland, after the Druids expelled the first missionary, Palladius. It was around the year 433 that Patrick arrived in Ireland, and the Druids were up in arms against him. He began his missionary activity in the area where he had been held captive, paying the price of ransom to his former master, and in exchange for the servitude and cruelty endured at his hands to impart to him blessings and freedom of God's children. As he began his missionary work, tradition fondly points out the impression of St. Patrick's foot upon the hard rock — off the main shore, at the entrance to Skerries harbor. It was at the River Boyne that he performed his first miracle on Irish soil.

Patrick's humility and meekness won over many local chieftains to the faith, including Benen, the son of a chieftain whose family embraced the faith. Benan became Patrick's faithful companion, and one of Patrick's successors in Armagh. One of the most famous decrees of Patrick over the Druid chieftains occurred at Easter in 433. A royal decree went forth that all fires were to be extinguished until the signal blaze was kindled at the royal mansion. Patrick went to the hill across the valley from the royal mansion and lit a Paschal fire for all to see. The druids called to the king: 'O King, live forever; this fire, which has been lighted in defiance of the royal edict, will blaze forever in this land unless it be this very night extinguished'. Despite repeated attempts, the fire burned through the night, and Patrick, protected and shielded by divine power, came away unscathed from the snares and assaults of the druids. On Easter day the druids and magicians put forth their strength and all their incantations to maintain their sway over the Irish people. By their incantations, the druids overspread a darkness over the hill and plain worse than the Egyptian darkness. Patrick defied them to remove this, but when they were unable to do this, Patrick prayed and the sun broke through sending forth its rays, and the prayer and faith of Patrick achieved a glorious triumph. This was the final blow to paganism in the presence of the chieftains. This Easter victory marked the triumph of religion at Tara, and the Ard-Righ granted permission to Patrick throughout Ireland. It is said that Patrick wrote the prayer "St Patrick's Breastplate' for this victory over paganism.

This short introduction can only scratch the surface of the life of this great saint. There are many articles on the internet and books galore on the life and times of St. Patrick, a saint as relevant to us today as he was in his day.
