FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

As I mentioned in my last bulletin column, I wish to share more about my experience of the Holy Face of Jesus. We are blessed to have a presentation of the Holy Face of Jesus here at our church on Saturday evening, September 24th. There are two main relics of the Holy Face of Jesus. The one is in Rome. This is the one that will be presented at our parish and for which St. Therese the Little Flower had such great devotion. It is a special relic reserved in St. Peter's Basilica and shown to the public once a year. The image presented at our church during the talk is a copy of that relic.

There is a second tradition of the Holy Face of Jesus and it is with this tradition that I have more experience. A small city on the eastern side of Italy called Manoppello is said to have preserved this holy relic for the last number of centuries. It is a remarkable image, not because it is beautiful but rather because it is so moving. It depicts the suffering face of Jesus. His features are unremarkable, even sad. The cloth is made from the most costly fabric of the ancient world, mussel silk. This fabric is so thin that it cannot absorb dyes. Yet the image of Jesus is clearly seen upon the image. I have visited this image twice. One can stand within one foot of the image, the fabric being protected by a thin sheet of glass. When one looks straight at the fabric, the image of Jesus' face is clearly visible. But if one stands just a few feet to the side, the fabric remains but the image disappears. When sunlight passes through the fabric the image disappears. Scientists have studied the image and no pigment is seen.

This scientific phenomenon is remarkable. But for me the most powerful aspect of the image is to gaze upon the Lord's face and particularly upon his eyes. His countenance seems mournful, yet not despairing. He appears reflective and with love. As I gazed into his eyes, I sensed a gaze of love from Jesus back to me, far more intense, inviting and deep than I could ever give in return. Art always evokes a response in the human soul, but in this image of Jesus the response seemed to exceed the capacity of art, the presence of God seemed self-evident.

This coming weekend at each of the Masses, I will update everyone briefly on the campaign. We will also have two light receptions, Oct 4th & Oct 11th, for those who have further questions. Brochures describing the details of the campaign remain in the back of the church. Thank you again for all who have supported the campaign. ~ Blessings to each of you this coming week.

May St. John the Baptist pray for us.
