OLD TESTAMENT READINGS

A reading from the second book of Maccabees

12:43-46

It is good and holy to think of the dead rising again.

Judas, the ruler of Israel,
took up a collection among all his soldiers,
amounting to two thousand silver drachmas,
which he sent to Jerusalem to provide for an expiatory sacrifice.
In doing this he acted in a very excellent and noble way,
inasmuch as he had the resurrection of the dead in view;
for if he were not expecting the fallen to rise again,
it would have been useless and foolish to pray for them in death.
But if he did this with a view to the splendid reward
that awaits those who had gone to rest in godliness,
it was a holy and pious thought.
Thus he made atonement for the dead
that they might be freed from this sin.

Reading from the book of Job

19:1, 23-27

I know that my Redeemer lives.

Job answered and said:

Oh, would that my words were written down!
Would that they were inscribed in a record:
That with an iron chisel and with lead
they were cut in the rock forever!
But as for me, I know that my Vindicator lives,
and that he will at last stand forth upon the dust;
Whom I myself shall see:
my own eyes, not another's, shall behold him,
And from my flesh I shall see God;
my inmost being is consumed with longing.

3:1-9

For if before men, indeed they be punished, yet is their hope full of immortality;

Chastised a little, they shall be greatly blessed, because God tried them and found them worthy of himself.

As gold in the furnace, he proved them, and as sacrificial offerings he took them to himself.

In the time of their visitation they shall shine, and shall dart about as sparks through stubble;

They shall judge nations and rule over peoples, and the Lord shall be their King forever.

Those who trust in him shall understand truth, and the faithful shall abide with him in love:

Because grace and mercy are with his holy ones, and his care is with his elect.

A reading from the book of Wisdom

4:7-15

A blameless life is a ripe old age.

The just man, though he die early, shall be at rest. For the age that is honorable comes not with the passing of time, nor can it be measured in terms of years. Rather, understanding is the hoary crown for men, and an unsullied life, the attainment of old age. He who pleased God was loved; he who lived among sinners was transported-Snatched away, lest wickedness pervert his mind or deceit beguile his soul; For the witchery of paltry things obscures what is right and the whirl of desire transforms the innocent mind. Having become perfect in a short while, he reached the fullness of a long career; for his soul was pleasing to the LORD, therefore he sped him out of the midst of wickedness. But the people saw and did not understand, nor did they take this into account.

A reading from the book of the prophet Isaiah

25:6a, 7-9

The Lord God will destroy death for ever.

On this mountain the Lord of hosts
will provide for all peoples.
On this mountain he will destroy
the veil that veils all peoples,
The web that is woven over all nations;
he will destroy death forever.
The Lord God will wipe away
the tears from all faces;
The reproach of his people he will remove
from the whole earth; for the Lord has spoken.

On that day it will be said:

"Behold our God, to whom we looked to save us!

This is the Lord for whom we looked;
let us rejoice and be glad that he has saved us!"

A reading from the book of Lamentations

3:17-26

It is good to wait in silence for the Lord God to save.

My soul is deprived of peace,
I have forgotten what happiness is;
I tell myself my future is lost,
all that I hoped for from the Lord.
The thought of my homeless poverty
is wormwood and gall;
Remembering it over and over
leaves my soul downcast within me.
But I will call this to mind,
as my reason to have hope:

The favors of the Lord are not exhausted, his mercies are not spent;
They are renewed each morning, so great is his faithfulness.
My portion is the Lord, says my soul; therefore will I hope in him.

Good is the Lord to one who waits for him, to the soul that seeks him; It is good to hope in silence for the saving help of the Lord.

A reading from the book of the prophet Daniel

12:1-3

Of those who lie sleeping in the dust of the earth many will awake.

In those days, I, Daniel, mourned and heard this word of the Lord:

"At that time there shall arise Michael, the great prince, guardian of your people; It shall be a time unsurpassed in distress since nations began until that time. At that time your people shall escape, everyone who is found written in the book.

Many of those who sleep in the dust of the earth shall awake;
Some shall live forever,
others shall be an everlasting horror and disgrace.
But the wise shall shine brightly
like the splendor of the firmament,
And those who lead the many to justice
shall be like the stars forever."

R/. The Lord is my shepherd; there is nothing I shall want. or:

R/. Though I walk in the valley of darkness, I fear no evil, for you are with me.

The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want. in verdant pastures he gives me repose; Beside restful waters he leads me; he refreshes my soul. R/.

He guides me in right paths for his name sake.

Even though I walk in the dark valley I fear no evil; for you are at my side With your rod and your staff that give me courage. R/.

You spread the table before me in the sight of my foes;
You anoint my head with oil;
my cup overflows. R/.

Only goodness and kindness follow me all the days of my life;
And I shall dwell in the house of the Lord for years to come. R/.

Psalm 25:6 and 7b, 17-18, 20-21

R/. To you, O Lord, I lift my soul. or:

R/. No one who waits for you, O Lord, will ever be put to shame.

Remember that your compassion, O Lord, and your kindness are from of old. In your kindness remember me, because of your goodness, O Lord. R/.

Relieve the troubles of my heart;
And bring me out of my distress.
Put an end to my affliction and my suffering;
and take away all my sins. R/.

Preserve my life and rescue me; let me not be put to shame, for I take refuge in you. Let integrity and uprightness preserve me, Because I wait for you, O Lord. R/.

Psalm 27:1, 4, 7 and 8b and 9a, 13-14

R/. The Lord is my light and my salvation.

or:

R/. I believe that I shall see the good things of the Lord in the land of the living.

The Lord is my light and my salvation; whom should I fear?

The Lord is my life's refuge; of whom should I be afraid? R/.

One thing I ask of the Lord; this I seek:

To dwell in the house of the Lord all the days of my life.

That I may gaze on the loveliness of the Lord and contemplate his temple. R/.

Hear, O Lord, the sound of my call; have pity on me, and answer me. Your presence, O Lord, I seek. Hide not your face from me. R/.

I believe that I shall see the bounty of the Lord in the land of the living.

Wait for the Lord with courage;
be stouthearted, and wait for the Lord. R/.

Psalm 42 and 43

R/. My soul is thirsting for the living God: when shall I see him face to face?

As the hind longs for the running waters, so my soul longs for you, O God. R/.

Athirst is my soul for God, the living God.

When shall I go and behold the face of God? R/.

Send forth your light and your fidelity; they shall lead me on And bring me to your holy mountain, to your dwelling-place. R/.

Then will I go in to the altar of God, the God of my gladness and joy; Then will I give you thanks upon the harp, O God, my God! R/.

Why are you downcast, O my soul?
Why do you sigh within me?
Hope in God! For I shall again be thanking him,
in the presence of my savior and my God. R/.

Psalm 63:2, 3-4, 5-6, 8-9

R/. My soul is thirsting for you, O Lord my God.

O God, you are my God whom I seek; for you my flesh pines and my soul thirsts like the earth, parched, lifeless and without water. R/.

Thus have I gazed toward you in the sanctuary to see your power and your glory,
For your kindness is a greater good than life;
my lips shall glorify you. R/.

Thus will I bless you while I live; lifting up my hands, I will call upon your name. As with the riches of a banquet shall my soul be satisfied, and with exultant lips my mouth shall praise you. R/.

You are my help, and in the shadow of your wings I shout for joy. My soul clings fast to you; your right hand upholds me. R/.

Psalm 103:8 and 10, 13-14, 15-16, 17-18

R/. The Lord is kind and merciful. or:

R/. The salvation of the just comes from the Lord.

Merciful and gracious is the Lord, slow to anger, and abounding in kindness. Not according to our sins does he deal with us, nor does he requite us according to our crimes. R/.

As a father has compassion on his children, so the Lord has compassion on those who fear him. For he knows how we are formed, he remembers that we are dust. R/.

Man's days are like those of grass; like a flower of the field he blooms; The wind sweeps over him and he is gone, and his place knows him no more. R/.

But the kindness of the Lord is from eternity, to eternity toward those who fear him, And his justice toward children's children among those who keep his covenant and remember to fulfill his precepts. R/.

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Psalm 116:5, 6, 10-11, 15-16ac
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R/. I will walk in the presence of the Lord in the land of the living.
or:
R/. Alleluia.

Gracious is the Lord and just;
  yes, our God is merciful. R/.

The Lord keeps the little ones;
  I was brought low, and he saved me. R/.
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I believed, even when I said,
"I am greatly afflicted";
I said in my alarm,
"No man is dependable." R/.

Precious in the eyes of the Lord

is the death of his faithful ones.

O Lord, I am your servant, you have loosed my bonds. R/.

Psalm 122

R/. I rejoiced when I heard them say: let us go to the house of the Lord. or:

R/. Let us go rejoicing to the house of the Lord.

I rejoiced because they said to me,
"We will go up to the house of the Lord."
And now we have set foot
within your gates, O Jerusalem. R/.

Jerusalem, built as a city with compact unity.

To it the tribes go up,

To it the tribes go up, the tribes of the Lord. R/.

According to the decree for Israel, to give thanks to the name of the Lord. In it are set up judgment seats, seats for the house of David. R/.

Pray for the peace of Jerusalem!

May those who love you prosper!

May peace be within your walls,

prosperity in your buildings. R/.

Because of my relatives and friends
I will say "Peace be within you!"
Because of the house of the Lord, our God,
I will pray for your good. R/.

Psalm 130:1-2, 3-4, 5-6ab, 6c-7, 8

R/. Out of the depths, I cry to you, Lord. or:

R/. I hope in the Lord, I trust in his word.

Out of the depths I cry to you, O Lord; Lord, hear my voice! Let your ears be attentive to my voice in supplication. R/.

If you, O Lord, mark iniquities, Lord, who can stand? But with you is forgiveness, that you may be revered. R/.

I trust in the Lord; my soul trusts in his word. My soul waits for the Lord more than the sentinels wait for the dawn. R/.

For with the Lord is kindness and with him is plenteous redemption. And he will redeem Israel from all their iniquities. R/.

Psalm 143:1-2, 5-6, 7ab and 8ab, 10

R/. O Lord, hear my prayer.

O Lord, hear my prayer; hearken to my pleading in your faithfulness; in your justice answer me. And enter not into judgment with your servant, for before you no living man is just. R/.

I remember the days of old;
I meditate on all your doings;
the works of your hands I ponder.
I stretch out my hands to you;
my soul thirsts for you like parched land. R/.

Hasten to answer me, O Lord; for my spirit fails me. At dawn let me hear of your mercy, for in you I trust. R/.

Teach me to do your will, for you are my God. May your good spirit guide me on level ground. R/.

NEW TESTAMENT READINGS

During the Easter season, reading C8, C9, C10, or C11 is used as the first reading instead of a reading from the Old Testament. These readings may also be used for the second reading.

C8

Longer form:

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

10:34-43

God has appointed Jesus to judge everyone, alive and dead.

Peter proceeded to address the people in these words:

"In truth, I see that God shows no partiality.

Rather, in every nation whoever fears him and acts uprightly is acceptable to him.

You know the word that he sent to the Israelites

as he proclaimed peace through Jesus Christ, who is Lord of all,

what has happened all over Judea,

beginning in Galilee after the baptism

that John preached,

how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth

with the Holy Spirit and power.

He went about doing good

and healing all those oppressed by the devil,

for God was with him.

We are witnesses of all that he did

both in the country of the Jews and in Jerusalem.

They put him to death by hanging him on a tree.

This man God raised on the third day and granted that he be visible,

not to all the people, but to us,

the witnesses chosen by God in advance,

who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead.

He commissioned us to preach to the people

and testify that he is the one appointed by God

as judge of the living and the dead.

To him all the prophets bear witness,

that everyone who believes in him

will receive forgiveness of sins through his name."

Shorter form:

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

10:34-36, 42-43

God has appointed Jesus to judge everyone, alive and dead.

Peter proceeded to address the people in these words:
"In truth, I see that God shows no partiality.
Rather, in every nation whoever fears him and acts uprightly is acceptable to him.

You know the word that he sent to the Israelites as he proclaimed peace through Jesus Christ, who is Lord of all.

He commissioned us to preach to the people and testify that he is the one appointed by God as judge of the living and the dead.

To him all the prophets bear witness, that everyone who believes in him will receive forgiveness of sins through his name."

A reading from the book of Revelation

14:13

Happy are those who die in the Lord

I heard a voice from heaven say, "Write this:

Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord from now on."

"Yes," said the Spirit,

"let them find rest from their labors,
for their works accompany them."

A reading from the book of Revelation

20:11-21:1

The dead were judged according to their deeds.

I saw a large white throne and the one who was sitting on it.

The earth and the sky fled from his presence and there was no place for them.

I saw the dead, the great and the lowly, standing before the throne, and scrolls were opened.

Then another scroll was opened, the book of life.

The dead were judged according to their deeds, by what was written in the scrolls.

The sea gave up its dead;

then Death and Hades gave up their dead.

All the dead were judged according to their deeds.

Then Death and Hades were thrown into the pool of fire.

(This pool of fire is the second death.)

Anyone whose name was not found written in the book of life was thrown into the pool of fire.

Then I saw a new heaven and a new earth.

The former heaven and the former earth had passed away, and the sea was no more.

A reading from the Book of Revelation

21:1-5a, 6b-7

There will be no more death.

I saw a new heaven and a new earth.

The former heaven and the former earth had passed away, and the sea was no more.

I also saw the holy city, a new Jerusalem, coming down out of heaven from God, prepared as a bride adorned for her husband.

I heard a loud voice from the throne saying, "Behold, God's dwelling is with the human race.

He will dwell with them and they will be his people and God himself will always be with them as their God.

He will wipe every tear from their eyes,

and there shall be no more death or mourning, wailing

or pain, for the old order has passed away."

The one who sat on the throne said, "Behold, I make all things new. I am the Alpha and the mega, the beginning and the end. To the thirsty I will give a gift from the spring of life-giving water. The victor will inherit these gifts, and I shall be his God, and he will be my son."

ADDITIONAL NEW TESTAMENT READINGS

A reading from the Letter of Saint Paul to the Romans

5:5-11

Having been justified by his blood, we will be saved from God's anger through him.

Hope does not disappoint,

because the love of God has been poured out into our hearts through the Holy Spirit who has been given to us.

For Christ, while we were still helpless,

died at the appointed time for the ungodly.

Indeed, only with difficulty does one die for a just person,

though perhaps for a good person

one might even find courage to die.

But God proves his love for us

in that while we were still sinners Christ died for us.

How much more then, since we are now justified by his Blood, will we be saved through him from the wrath.

Indeed, if, while we were enemies,

we were reconciled to God through the death of his Son, how much more, once reconciled, will we be saved by his life.

Not only that,

but we also boast of God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have now received reconciliation.

5:17-21

Where sin increased, there grace abounded all the more.

If, by the transgression of the one, death came to reign through that one, how much more will those who receive the abundance of grace and of the gift of justification come to reign in life through the one Jesus Christ.

In conclusion, just as through one transgression condemnation came upon all, so, through one righteous act, acquittal and life came to all.

For just as through the disobedience of the one man the many were made sinners, so through the obedience of the one the many will be made righteous.

The law entered in so that transgression might increase but, where sin increased, grace overflowed all the more, so that, as sin reigned in death, grace also might reign through justification for eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Longer form:

A reading from the letter of Paul to the Romans

6:3-9

Let us walk in the newness of life.

A reading from the Letter of Saint Paul to the Romans

Are you unaware that we who were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death?

We were indeed buried with him through baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might live in newness of life.

For if we have grown into union with him through a death like his, we shall also be united with him in the resurrection.

We know that our old self was crucified with him, so that our sinful body might be done away with, that we might no longer be in slavery to sin.

For a dead person has been absolved from sin.

If, then, we have died with Christ, we believe that we shall also live with him.

We know that Christ, raised from the dead, dies no more; death no longer has power over him.

Shorter form:

A reading from the letter of Paul to the Romans

6:3-4, 8-9

Let us walk in the newness of life.

A reading from the Letter of Saint Paul to the Romans

Are you unaware that we who were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death?

We were indeed buried with him through baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might live in newness of life.

If, then, we have died with Christ, we believe that we shall also live with him.

We know that Christ, raised from the dead, dies no more; death no longer has power over him.

8:14-23

We groan while we wait for the redemption of our bodies.

Those who are led by the Spirit of God are sons of God.

For you did not receive a spirit of slavery to fall back into fear, but you received a spirit of adoption, through which we cry, Abba, "Father!"

The Spirit itself bears witness with our spirit that we are children of God, and if children, then heirs, heirs of God and joint heirs with Christ, if only we suffer with him so that we may also be glorified with him.

I consider that the sufferings of this present time are as nothing compared with the glory to be revealed for us.

For creation awaits with eager expectation the revelation of the children of God; for creation was made subject to futility, not of its own accord but because of the one who subjected it, in hope that creation itself would be set free from slavery to corruption and share in the glorious freedom of the children of God.

We know that all creation is groaning in labor pains even until now; and not only that, but we ourselves, who have the firstfruits of the Spirit, we also groan within ourselves as we wait for adoption, the redemption of our bodies.

8:31b-35, 37-39

Who can ever come between us and the love of Christ?

If God is for us, who can be against us?

He did not spare his own Son
 but handed him over for us all,
 will he not also give us everything else along with him?

Who will bring a charge against God's chosen ones?

It is God who acquits us.

Who will condemn?

It is Christ Jesus who died, rather, was raised,
 who also is at the right hand of God,
 who indeed intercedes for us.

What will separate us from the love of Christ?

Will anguish, or distress or persecution, or famine,
 or nakedness, or peril, or the sword?

No, in all these things, we conquer overwhelmingly through him who loved us.

For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor present things, nor future things, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor any other creature will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

14:7-9, 10b-12

Whether alive or dead, we belong to the Lord.

None of us lives for oneself,
and no one dies for oneself.

For if we live, we live for the Lord,
and if we die, we die for the Lord;
so then, whether we live or die, we are the Lord's.

For this is why Christ died and came to life,
that he might be Lord of both the dead and the living.

Why then do you judge your brother?

For we shall all stand before the judgment seat of God;
for it is written:

"As I live, says the Lord, every knee shall bend before me, and every tongue shall give praise to God."

So then each of us shall give an accounting of himself to God.

Longer form:

A reading from the first Letter of Saint Paul to the Corinthians 15:20-23, 24b-28 All people will be brought to life in Christ.

Christ has been raised from the dead, the firstfruits of those who have fallen asleep.

For since death came through a human being,

the resurrection of the dead came also through a human being.

For just as in Adam all die,

so too in Christ shall all be brought to life,

but each one in proper order:

Christ the firstfruits;

then, at his coming, those who belong to Christ;

then comes the end,

when he hands over the kingdom to his God and Father.

For he must reign until he has put all his enemies under his feet.

The last enemy to be destroyed is death,

for "he subjected everything under his feet."

But when it says that everything has been subjected,

it is clear that it excludes the One who subjected everything to him.

When everything is subjected to him,

then the Son himself will also be subjected

to the One who subjected everything to him,

so that God may be all in all.

For believers the funeral liturgies are a welcome expression of our trust in God's promise of resurrection and new life. As we move from the tragedy of Good Friday to the wonder of Easter with each year's experience of Triduum so, too, in the rituals of the Christian funeral the church accompanies us from sorrow to joy, albeit tempered, as we acknowledge what it is we believe and proclaim.

Central to the funeral liturgies is our belief that Jesus, by his own death and resurrection, broke the chains of sin and death that bound all humanity. We are brought into this mystery through the initiation sacraments of baptism, confirmation and eucharist. As Paul writes to the Romans: "You have been taught that when we were baptized in Christ Jesus we were baptized into his death; in other words when we were baptized we went into the tomb with him and joined him in death, so that as Christ was raised by the Father's glory, we too might live a new life. If in union with Christ we have imitated his death, we shall also imitate him in his resurrection." (Romans 6:3-5)

As human beings we find it difficult to move from the grief of the loss of a loved one to the celebration of the Christian funeral mass. We recall that the Mass is the memorial of Christ's death and resurrection. We encourage you to reach out to the priests, bereavement ministers, and community of Saint John the Baptist Church for continued support and prayer.
